Is That Broken Hallelujah Still Reparable?

When one of our congregational leaders asked me if I would teach another class on Leonard Cohen, my initial reaction was: "Really? Why?" Yes, the late singer-songwriter is one of my musical heroes. Yes, his fifth yahrzeit is this month. And, yes, his music still inspires millions of people all over the world, especially with the release of his posthumous album, "Thanks For the Dance."

I was wrong to have doubted my choice to teach this class. The truth is: in past excursions into Leonard Land, I had barely scratched the surface. Some years ago, a friend of mine had been working on his doctoral dissertation on Cohen's work, and I can see why.

Forget, for a moment, his ubiquitous song "Hallelujah." Cohen's oeuvre extended back to his early days as a novelist and a poet, his decades as a songwriter, and beyond. In our new class on Leonard Cohen – "Leonard Cohen Revisited" – Wednesday evenings, December 1, 8, and 15, 7 pm – we will look at some of Cohen's Jewishly-themed poems (some of which we use in our worship services); his songs (some of which contain oblique references to the Shoah, which is extremely rare in popular music); and some surprise revelations, soon to be published in English, about his visit to Israel to entertain Israeli troops during the Yom Kippur War.



From the President

We want everyone to feel comfortable returning to in-person worship and other activities at Temple Israel – many of you have called me to confirm that we will continue to require all in-person visitors to either be vaccinated or have received a recent negative COVID test result. Considering Governor DeSantis' aggressive stance against the COVID policies of our school board and local businesses like the Kravis Center, I certainly understand the concerns!

The Kravis Center's current COVID-19 policy does not mandate vaccination – it does require that all visitors either present evidence of their prior vaccination <u>or</u> evidence of a recent negative COVID-19 test result and further requires everyone wear a mask while attending events. Given the fact that thousands of people attend each event at the Kravis, it makes perfect sense that they would put public safety first and provide the safest possible environment for everyone. We support that approach and are modeling our COVID policy in a similar manner. The Kravis Center will have trouble staying afloat if they can't control the safety of their environment so people will not be afraid to come... and Temple Israel is in exactly the same position.

Clearly everyone makes choices – from our perspective, the most important choice facing each congregant is, "am I comfortable returning to Temple Israel for in-person worship and activities now?" We want that answer to be a resounding, "YES!" Accordingly, we are doing everything to provide the safest possible environment for everyone at Temple Israel as well.

Therefore, it is now the policy of Temple Israel to require that all adult visitors to our campus either present evidence of their prior COVID-19 vaccination or evidence of a recent negative COVID-19 test result and to further require everyone wear a mask while attending services and programs. Our religious school will continue to follow guidance from the Palm Beach County School Board.

As infection rates decline and we receive additional guidance from the CDC, our medical consultants will evaluate and possibly revise our policies but always with an eye toward maintaining the safest environment for everyone – not only is that our public obligation, it is the Jewish thing to do!

I look forward to seeing you at Temple soon!

The *Mussar* Moment

FRIDAY NIGHT LIGHTS AND MUSSAR

Here's my early morning confession. Eileen and I are binging "Friday Night Lights". We couldn't figure out why we had never watched it when it was on regular television till the light went on and we remembered that we were always at Temple on Friday nights. It was in the days when it wasn't that easy to record programs and who had time anyway to watch what you recorded.

I don't know if the Coach, Mrs. Taylor, or Tim Riggins are my favorite characters. We are six episodes from the conclusion so don't judge me yet. But the Coach always has something to say that brings me back to Mussar. I can't quote him directly but in one episode he is offering his version of advice to one of his boys and tells him: Being a good man is not about perfection; it is about trying. I am sure he was more down-home country than that.

But it is such a good lesson to remember when we try to live up to an ideal or "*middah* -trait" that is difficult and challenging. Like the one we are engaging with the beginning of this Mussar year: "Judgement". It is not the judgement like in judgement day; it is not the judgement like in the High Court of the land; it is the piece of ourselves that tends to judge other people from the minute we walk out the door to the time our heads hit the pillow. It is the assumptions we make about people based on their dress, their attitudes, their behavior, their stature, you name it. It is almost an involuntary reflex. Our sages understood this and Rashi converted a line from Leviticus meant for real life judges (like in court) to mean: "*Dan I'kaf zechut"* – *Judge others on the side of merit.* Think favorably and find the good in them first.

Seems reasonable and easy enough at first glance. And it is in most of our everyday transactions; the person in front of us in line at the grocery store; the car at the red light not making the right turn; the friend who walks by us on the street and doesn't greet us as warmly as usual. But where the rubber meets the road and Coach Taylor comes back to be our Rabbi is when we are challenged to judge on the side of good the intentions and the actions of people and politicians (who I admit are also people) with whom we deeply disagree. Find the good in them our tradition instructs. Find the spark of the Divine in them. Judge them on the side of merit.

It is tough stuff. Reb Taylor says: It is not about perfection; it is all about trying.


Keep an eye out for a special card on your birthday, as Sisterhood will be sending best wishes to all our members. We thank Diana Strauss for chairing this project.

SEVEN SPECIES COOKING: PECAN BARLEY SALAD with Pam Wiener & Bill Baker

INGREDIENTS

1 cup quick-cooking barley

2 cups water

½ teaspoon salt

3/4 cup pecans (3oz), chopped

1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil

2 medium carrots, cut into ¼ inch diced

2 celery ribs, cut into 1/4 inch dice

1/4 cup chopped fresh dill

1/4 cup finely chopped shallot (1 large)

2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice

•Bring barley, water and salt to a boil in a 2-quart heavy saucepan, then reduce heat and simmer, covered, until barley is tender, about 10 minutes. Remove from heat and let stand, covered, for 5 minutes. Drain barley in a colander, then rinse under cold water and drain well.

- •While barley is simmering, cook pecans in oil in a heavy skillet over moderately low heat, stirring frequently, until nuts are toasted 1 shade darker, for about 4 minutes.
- •Toss nuts and oil with barley and remaining ingredients in a large bowl, then season with salt and pepper. Enjoy!

SWEETS FOR YOUR TABLE: BOW KICHEL Baking with lbby Lucas



EQUIPMENT

Mixer, paddle beater Plate to cover mixing bowl

Rubber spatula Rolling pin
2 large cookie sheets Pizza cutter
Parchment paper to fit Oven mitts

INGREDIENTS

5 eggs, room temperature 2½ cups flour ½ cups oil (vegetable) 2 tsp sugar

1+ tsp Vanilla (pure extract) 1½ cups sugar (set to side)

- 1. Place first 6 ingredients in mixer bowl. With paddle, blend at low speed until incorporated (about 2"), then beat at High for 5 minutes.
- 2. Cover with plate and let rest 1 hour, until soft and spongy.
- 3. Preheat oven to 350°F. Line 2 cookie sheets with parchment paper.
- 4. Heavily sprinkle counter with 1½ cups sugar. Flatten and roll out to rectangle, about 15"x20" or so, a little thicker than pie crust dough, heavily sugared.
- 5. Cut into ¾" strips; cut strips into 2" lengths. Twist in middle like bowties. Place on cookie sheets about 1" apart.
- 6. Bake about 25-30 minutes until lightly brown until center is dry.

An easy way to begin flattening dough is by pressing gently with plastic wrap. Before baking, make sure the bowties are sugared on both sides. After turning off oven, place all cookies in a rimmed pan, return to oven for a while to really dry out. Then store in tightly sealed container. Will last months.

Makes about 80, depending on size
